

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



Badger Guillermo Gilberto “Bill” Rodriguez - 1/22/55 - 3/3/25



It is with profound sadness that we announce the passing of Guillermo Gilberto Rodriguez “Bill” who departed this world on March 3, 2025 at the age of 70. Born on January 22, 1955 in Lima, Peru.

Bill worked 30 years at the United States Postal Office until his retirement in 2015. He served as the Union President for the last half of his career. He was a proud Vietnam Era Army Veteran and an avid antique motorcycle builder and enthusiast. He loved his family, riding with his friends, and his river house up north.

AHRMA Vintage Races - Hastings, NE - 5/30/25 to 6/1/25

We headed to Hastings, NE at the end of May for the American Historic Racing Motorcycle Association (AHRMA) races. Along the way we made a stop at the Rowe Sanctuary on the Platte River, a notable migration stop-over for sandhill cranes.

The usual format for AHRMA racing is practice sessions on Friday, with racing on Saturday and Sunday following shorter track practice sessions. Wade enjoys getting acquainted with the features of different tracks during

the season. Before race day AHRMA offers a track walk, during which expert riders familiar with the track give advice about how to approach each turn & section of the course. This event's track walk, in light rain, was conducted by Nick Ienatsch, a motorcycle racer, author on riding techniques, and instructor at Yamaha Champions Riding School. AHRMA also has riding school for aspiring racers.

Wade's race bike is a 1968 Honda CB450. "It takes a village": he had a lot of help prepping the bike from his friend Tim Schneider (most of the bike) and Dale Coffman (the engine). Our friend Rob Himmelmann trailered the bike down to Hastings, making travel easy.

Wade races in 2 classes: RR Novice Historic Production Lightweight, and RR Novice Historic Production Heavyweight. In the Heavyweight class he had quite a duel with William Dokianos, ending up in 3rd. Since old bikes tend to break down when ridden hard, Wade ended

up on top of the podium in the lightweight class due to attrition of the other bikes in the class (but of course he's fast too!)

AHRMA events are well organized, and the people are friendly, fun, and safety-oriented. While there are classes for modern bikes as well, watching the older bikes out on the track is just magic. There will be AHRMA racing at Blackhawk Farms Raceway in South Beloit the weekend of August 1-3----check it out!

Brewtown Rumble 2025/BUILD Moto Challenge - Milwaukee, WI - 6/7/25

The 2025 Brewtown Rumble enjoyed a beautiful June day and Davidson Park is a great venue for this event. There were plenty of beautiful bikes to admire with their owners happy to describe their machines. My favorite was the 1968 Benelli 125, a make I'd never seen before.

The centerpiece of the event was the BUILD Moto challenge, in which BUILD teams raced each other to complete a task. The teams did not know which task would be assigned until about 15 minutes before the event. No power tools are allowed for the challenge and the mentors' contributions are limited to advice before the event starts. The bikes were XG500 Street bikes provided by Harley-Davidson. This year's task was to remove the bike's battery and replace it, then start the bike.

It is exciting to see the BUILD program expanding beyond the Milwaukee area. I spent some time talking to the team from Tomahawk WI, who incorporated some regionally distinct touches into their bike, such as a hockey puck on the foot peg, and the bike number plate 715 (their area code).

The BUILD Moto season includes multiple events, with points awarded for each event. The overall winner for the season was the Columbus BUILD Moto team. It is very heartening to see the results of this program, with camaraderie among the young people and some sharp looking bikes.

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

A Thousand Miles on a Trident

It all started innocently one night. I was reading a motorcycle encyclopedia and came upon an entry for triple cylinder engines. I have ridden a lot of engine configurations from horizontal singles to flat sixes, but I never had a go with a triple. Then, not two days later we ran into a Laverda Jota at Wau-seon and the hook was set.

Over the next few months I gandered at a string of Laverdas, BSA, and Triumph triples. None really spoke to me and the owners were generally forthcoming about all the faults that needed addressing. Most were almost mystically terrified of working on their triples and it showed in dirty, leaky machines that were fussy starters.

Late in the season, a lovely 1972 Triumph T150v came up for sale south of Indianapolis. It was about 90 percent original and wearing the distinctive Royal Purple available on '72 Tridents. In looking at the VIN, I realized this was an unusual bike. Being built in late June 1972, it had every upgrade found on the '73 models, which began production in July, with one exception; the bike was one of the last to leave Meriden with a conical drum front!

The owner turned out to be a fellow AMCA member who used to live near my neighborhood. The bike was better than described on the phone and started easily in two kicks from dead cold in 20 degree weather. I went over the Trident during the dark days of winter only to discover the previous owner was 100 percent honest. Everything was done correctly and with factory fit parts. The bike even came with a fresh high end battery, several OEM manuals, brand new Dunlop tt100s, and a cover. I could not wait for spring and as soon as the weather broke, the Trident started getting used.

In a little over ten weeks, I put more than 1,000 miles on the Trident in all sorts of riding. From commuting to work in Chicago traffic to a 250-mile round trip to our spring chapter meeting, the Trident has not missed a beat. It has been 100 percent reliable, almost always starting first kick. Other than kicking it to life, the Trident is very much like a modern bike. It simply scoots along and is fully usable in modern traffic. Even the conicals work extremely well on this bike thanks to extended length levers.



The biggest problem is how addictive it is to rev the bike. It simply howls with glee the harder you twist the throttle. However, everyone seems to love the sound. Neighbors who normally scowl at my noisy bikes give the Trident a huge thumbs up. Overall, the bike feels much lighter on the road

than its 500 pound wet weight would suggest. It is easy to pull double parking space u turns as well as walk the bike in traffic. The clutch action is heavy but very progressive and the five speed gearbox delightful.

Out on the road, the Trident has excellent road holding manners and feels much like a late 80s Honda product. It simply holds a line and rides remarkably well for a 55 year old bike. The most surprising thing to me is how much of a road burner this bike truly is. It adores being flogged on the highway and sits at 4200 rpm at a true 80mph for miles on end. There is a price to be paid for such fun in terms of fuel economy and oil use. Like testers in the 70s, I average in the mid-30s on economy and get through a bit less than a pint of oil every 300-400 miles depending on how hard I twist the throttle. My particular Trident is oil tight, there's no smoke in the exhaust, and the spark plugs are quite clean, so it's a mystery exactly where the oil escapes!

Speedy safely and enjoy your bikes this summer!



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EU AMCA Meet - Raalte, Netherlands - 5/30-31/25

Each year in the American Motorcycle (AMCA's quarterly print magazine), I see the advertisement for the European AMCA meet held at the American Motorcycle Museum (AMM) in Raalte, Netherlands. This annual event takes place at the end of May each year. I've always wanted to attend. Well, 2025 was the year I planned on going and I did.

The on-site hotel was already booked so I secured a room in Deventer, NL about 10 miles away. Taking the 11-hour flight from Milwaukee to Amsterdam was smooth and trouble free. In Amsterdam I picked up a rental car and headed east about 80 miles to drop my bags off at the hotel and then head to Raalte to see what

was going on.

The area is much like Wisconsin, nice rolling two lane roads. I arrived at the AMM and the 70 vendor spots were all marked off and people were setting up. The AMM provided each vending spot with tables and canopies. There was some slight rain, so the canopies were very much appreciated. I was impressed with the amount of JD, VL, singles, and Indian parts available. Lots of New Old Stock (NOS) parts in original boxes were available and plentiful.
